PLAYGROUND SAFETY SUPERVISION GUIDELINES

"Safety First! Working alongside you to help keep students and staff safe!"

While you are on the playground supervising children, here are some things you can look for.
Eighty percent (80%) of playground injuries result from falls. Toddlers and preschool-aged children require more attentive supervision than older children.



- Ensure children are playing on age-appropriate equipment (signage should be posted).
- Make sure children (and supervisors) are wearing appropriate footwear.



- Stop dangerous horseplay (throwing things, pushing, etc.).
- Stop children from wandering away from the play area.
- Account for all children.



• Remove hoodie and neck drawstrings from children's clothing before they play on the playground. Remove scarves. Remove mittens connected through the sleeves.



- Snow is not protective surfacing and does not protect children from significant fall heights. Do not use play structures if ice is present.
- Wet surfaces are slippery. Be cautious when equipment is wet.

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- Keep younger children separated from older ones if possible to avoid unintentional injuries.
- During hot days, check metal and plastic surfaces they can cause burns.
- Monitor high risk zones closely (e.g., swings, slides, and climbing structures).



Do not allow children to:

- Wear helmets
- Walk up or climb on slides. Slide feet first, facing forward, one at a time.
- Climb on or over rails, walls, barriers, roofs or swing frames.
- Run on, jump off or dive off equipment.
- Walk or climb on top of overhead horizontal ladders.

 Use hand rungs one at a time.



• Twist swing chains or jump out of the swing. Throw swing chain over the top swing bar.

Pick-up trash and report other items.

- Broken equipment (broken swings, loose bolts, missing end caps, etc.)
- Broken glass and other trash
- Cracks in plastic, rusted or corroded metals, rot
- Hazardous or dangerous debris (sticks, logs)
- Insects/birds nests
- Surfacing kicked out under swings or slides.





- Holes in surfacing, sandboxes, or entry walkways; ensure sandboxes have covers
- Vandalism

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
